IB 9832 Explorations in IB: How can one person make a difference?



Purpose

 Sophomores will investigate how individuals have made and continue to make a difference in their communities and the world through their own Personal Project, Action & Service as well as enrichment activities.

Expectations

- Students will inquire when they don't understand expectations or assignments, asking questions, seeking
 resources and finding them. Students will be independent by looking for answers first, then seeking Ms. Harper
 for an answer.
- Students will be **knowledgeabl**e of appropriate school decorum to arrive on time, where to sit, what their assignment is, where to turn it in, how to behave, where cell phones should be in seminar, and how to treat fellow students.
- Students will **think** about what is presented in seminar and apply it to their classes. What is taught in seminar is JRT IB policy and is applicable every day, every class.
- Students will **communicate** at appropriate times and in appropriate manners. No cell phones or laptops, unless otherwise indicated, are allowed. Student emails to Ms. Harper should have an appropriate tone. If a student has a problem, he/she will communicate with Ms. Harper and seek her help.
- Students will act in a **principled** manner in doing their assignments honestly and independently, in interacting with peers with respect, and during the seminar period by behaving with decorum.
- Students will exhibit an open mind by engaging authentically in seminar activities.
- Students will behave in a **caring** manner by being polite to Ms. Harper and their peers, by not talking while others are talking, raising your hand to be recognized, by not having your cell phone with you, and by engaging enthusiastically in seminar activities.
- Student will be **courageous** by calling out bad behavior (rudeness, bullying, cheating, for example) in their peers without being unkind. Students will volunteer in seminar.
- Students will seek **balance** in managing their school work and between school and recreation. When balance is out of kilter, students will seek help.
- Students will **reflect** on what an IB education means by participating in seminar activities.

Grading policy
