What is the Extended Essay?

- Must earn a passing grade on EE for the IB Diploma
- Independent research / investigation on a topic chosen by the student in cooperation with a supervisor at school.
- The research question should be focused and lend itself to investigation and analysis.
- No more than 4000 words (approximately 10-12 typed pages).
- Approximately 40 hours of work by the student.

Extended Essay is one of the 3 core requirements of the Diploma Programme

Changes from The diploma points matrix (May 2010 - November 2014):

- applied by the examiner at the end of the assessment of the essay, and is based solely on the candidate's reflections as detailed on the RPPF, with the supervisory comments and extended essay itself as context.

What can Parents do?

- Encourage students to stay on track
 - Ask about upcoming deadlines & how their research is going
- Encourage them to work on their EE at least 1 hour each weekend
- Support their efforts to do university level research by taking them to the VCU or U of Richmond Library Saturday mornings (can use their databases; may not check out books)
